50 Years of the Village Hall 1974—2024

Our Village Hall celebrates its 50 year anniversary this year. The original village hall opened in 1920. It was situated on the corner of Pancake Lane and Leverstock Green Way (A4147). A tennis court adjacent to the hall was included. After a fire ripped through the Hall in 1968, the wooden structure was deemed unsafe.

It took over 11 years to complete The Village Hall as we know it today. In 1963, the New Town Commission offered the Parish Trustees an opportunity of a new site next to the proposed new shopping centre in Leverstock Green. So, in November 1964 plans for the new Village Hall, to be built by the local authority, were shown to the newly formed LGVA. In January 1966 a subcommittee was set up to publish its findings into the requirements of a new village hall. By September 1966 LGVA was told that because of the "financial freeze" the project would be paused until December 1967. Negotiations developed with the Borough of Hemel Hempstead (who would eventually build the new Village Hall) who agreed to lease it back to LGVA.

In July 1968, after the fire, the old village hall was officially declared "unsatisfactory for public lettings" unless £1,200 was spent on repairs. Subsequently, it was only used for WI and LGVA meetings rather than public entertainment. In 1970/71, the Social Services Committee instructed the Council's engineer to proceed with the design in detail. Then, in July 1971 the LGVA agreed to contribute £5,000 towards the cost of the Hall.



The new hall was masterminded by Fred Buglass the founder of the I GVA.

The estimated cost at this point was £30,000. The go-ahead was given to build the new Hall.

Again, further cuts in grants by the Government meant that the halls plans were dropped. In 1972, new plans for the hall were drawn up. Finally, in December 1973, the Local Authority again decided to give the go-ahead on the building of the Hall, but now at an estimated cost of £70,000. Within a month the contractor had gone into liquidation. In 1974 new tenders were requested to build the hall now being quoted at over £100,000!!

The keys to the hall were eventually handed over to LGVA in July 1974. The freehold of the Hall has always been held by Dacorum Borough Council who then leased it back to the Village Association. Originally, the lease had to be held on behalf of LGVA by two nominated custodian trustees, but when the Village Association became a charitable incorporated organisation in 2017 it became possible to register the lease in the name of the LGVA itself. The current lease runs for 25 years from 2009.

The Trustees have always been determined to maintain the Hall and the activities to the highest standards. With the help of donations from the Parish Trust, hall hire income and fundraising activities such as the Summer Fete and Winter Fayre the Trustees have worked hard over time to achieve this.

Following a major extension carried out in 2007, the Hall has three major rooms available for hire. With an extensively equipped kitchen and bar it is now regarded as one of the best equipped and maintained community centres in the locality.

Leverstock Green Parish Trust

The present Parish Trust came into being officially on 25th March 1992 under a Scheme approved and established by the Charity Commissioners for England & Wales as the Scheme for the regulation of the Parish Hall Trust. Although not a church organisation, at the present time some of the Trustees are regular members of Holy Trinity Church: this is due in part to the terms of the original deed of 1920 which appointed the Vicar and Churchwardens as ex-officio Trustees.

The original Parish Hall Trust had its origins still earlier in 1904 when a committee was established

(with the vicar the Rev. Durrant as Chairman) to raise money in order to purchase land and have built a parish or village hall.

In July 1907 the Parish Hall Committee applied and was given consent for "the erection of a new parish hall on waste land in the parish of St. Michael Rural adjoining the main road from St. Albans to Hemel Hempstead.....provided it is placed at a distance not less than 60 feet from the fencing on the opposite side of the St. Albans Road". The Rev. Durrant's son was an architect and drew up plans for a suitable building.

In the early 1960s with the development of the New Town talk of a new hall for Leverstock

Green began. Leverstock Green Village Association was founded in 1962 by Fred Buglass to act as a voice for the whole community in this and other matters and discussions began with the charity commissioners with respect to the original trust. By 1967 they had declared they were not prepared to take over the parish hall trust as there was no obstacle to the deeds being transferred to another trust serving the same objects as the then Parish Hall. However, they agreed the original site could be sold and the money used to build on a new site. The last meeting of Parish Hall Trustees was held in January 1975.


On March 10th 1985 a public meeting of the Parish Hall Trust was held at which it was agreed to sell the Pancake Lane site with outline planning permission and to transfer same to the new Parish Trust, as approved by The Charity Commission. The money from the sale of the site was to be invested for the future.

The Parish Trust contributes to major maintenance expenses of The Village Hall. Any remaining income may be used for charitable purposes which are of general benefit to the residents of Leverstock Green

Some of the previous beneficiaries include the LGVA, local schools, tennis, football, and cricket clubs, local scouts and guides and the Holy Trinity Church. Grants are not given to individuals.

Applications for grants, supported by documentation, should be sent to the Parish Trust Secretary, via The Village Hall.

The Trust meets quarterly. If you are a local resident and interested in becoming a Trustee or would like further information, then please contact the Trust Secretary via The Village Hall.



Leverstock Green Playgroup

We are a friendly, safe, warming charity run playgroup/ pre school which has been in the Village Hall since September 1974. We have been supporting parents and nurturing children aged 2-5 years during this time. We teach our children through play and ensure they are ready for school when they leave us. We work together with our local schools.

In 2018 we received an Outstanding status from our Ofsted inspection

Our ethos is NURTURING THE INDIVIDUAL TO ACHIEVE, we believe that all children are individuals.

We will use our children's starting points - what they already know, experiences they have had, where they live and build on these giving them more knowledge and experiences through play using the key person approach. Focusing on speech and language, emotions and teaching our children in our care the skills they need to start school. These skills are independence, turn taking, being able to sit and listen, fine / gross motor skills needed to strengthen wrists ready to write, reading, movement, yoga, drama- imagination and much more adapting the environment for all children to access our curriculum. This is achieved in a warm, inclusive, loving, caring, friendly safe environment with rich, broad inclusive play based balanced curriculum for all our children. We use a blended approach. In the moment planning, Montessori (opportunities for independence and open ended resources), Reggio

Emilia (interactions with staff) and Bruner (scaffolding a child's learning) and John Bowlby (key person approach).

We aim to promote their independence by providing lots of choices and allowing them time for exploring, yet being available when needed.

We will always give recognition for their work, by either displaying it, including it in their learning journals or by praise. Praise will



always be given to a child for effort made or achieved and to reward good behaviour. We feel it is important to listen to the children and to spend time talking with them. We will always try to treat children with respect and honesty and in so doing we hope to raise their self-confidence and self-esteem.

Hobbs Hill Wood School

Hobbs Hill Wood Primary School has launched a new venture to support some of its more vulnerable families. Just before Christmas it launched its monthly 'Too Good to Go' Hub. The Hub is a place where people and companies can donate unwanted items or used items that are reusable. These items are then available free of charge for families to collect when the Hub is open on the last Friday of each month. The Hub has a wide range of items available including second-hand uniform, toiletries, food, new clothing and household goods. The items have been donated by parents and by companies in the local area including Tesco, Aldi, Iceland, Simmons, The Entertainer and TJ's at Bennetts End. The school has also received some cash donations to buy items to go into the Hub. Over 100 families have already visited the Hub which provided them with a range of items including essentials for Christmas Day. In January the Hub focussed on a specific theme 'Baking with children' following a substantial donation of baking items from Tesco.

Hobbs Hill Wood was also very grateful to win first prize from Tesco Community Grants. The money will help many of their families through the school and enable their children to start and end the day with healthy meals. Pictured below are School Council members receiving the cheque from Tesco.



Making History Leverstock Green CE Primary School

Leverstock Green History club was formed in the Summer term 2023. Not really knowing whether it would be a success, we soon realised how popular it was with all classes across both key stages. Initially we offered the club to KS2 pupils, but have recently introduced Year 2 as well.

The history club was a way in which we could dedicate more time for the children to expand their learning within existing topics as well as making it a fun after school club activity for an hour, every Monday.

The club is always led by what the children want to research and investigate. In order to get them passionate about the past. This has seen the children expand their knowledge around topics such as Henry VIII and his 6 wives, where we tried to rate which queen was the best. We have also played out the life of Henry the VIII and his 6 wives in the form of a play. Other topics have included a research on Alcatraz (San Francisco), as well as the Pacific War. We have learnt about Edward the Confessor and the events that led up to the Battle of Hastings in 1066. More recently we have been looking at famous historical battles. These have included the Battle of Thermopylae, as well as The Battle of the Somme, the Battle of Britain and the D-Day landings.

In the short period we have been running the club, there have been some incredible highlights of note. In particular, when learning all about Henry VIII, a pupil at the club went away and researched his own family line and found some incredible links to the past. A distant relative Gerald Fitzgerald (1487-1534) Great (x9) Grandfather of Lennie in Year 3, turned out to be very high up in Henry's royal court and was heavily involved in the paper work sent to the Pope to annul the marriage to Catherine of Aragon as well as signing off the papers for Anne Boleyn's execution. It really was an amazing moment to have a direct link to such a famous English king and only came to light because we were covering the topic at history club. A quite inspirational moment which got us thinking who else within the school might have such connections from the past?





There has been some fantastic parental engagement including Norman style helmets and armour to try on which the children enjoyed. When the children are able to interact with such resources, they become far more engaged with each topic. We now have a Roman and Greek helmet for the children to try when we cover the topics in class or for the club. There is a mix of children and abilities in the group but that hasn't hampered any learning, with all year groups enthusiastic.

Half way through the Academic Year, 2023-2024, the history club continues to be in high demand with the

parents and children. My aim is to continue to get children talking and researching about the past, whilst having fun and hope they all take that passion with them once they move onto secondary school and beyond.

The Fred Buglass Award was instigated in 2002 using funds from the Fred Buglass Legacy. Fred lived in Leverstock Green for 45 years until his death in 1998 at the age of 93. He was responsible for the formation of LGVA in 1962 and served as Chairman and Life President of the Association. He was instrumental in the building of the Village Hall and was awarded the British Empire Medal in 1986 for services to the community. His final act, following his death, was a generous legacy to the Village Association. Fred was largely responsible for



establishing the strong village identity and pleasant environment which we enjoy today. He was deservedly known as 'Mr Leverstock Green'.

Individuals who are eligible for the award must either live or work in Leverstock Green. They can be nominated for making a major contribution to the life of the village community, for promoting the identity of Leverstock Green or making a major contribution towards conserving or improving the environment of the village. The award was initially presented annually although there are some years with no presentation due to a lack of nominations.

At the AGM in November 2023 the award was presented to Lesley Hicks, the Village Hall administrator. Whilst Lesley is a paid employee she devotes a huge amount of additional time to ensure the smooth running of the hall, assisting at fund raising events such as the annual summer fete and even standing in for the caretaker when he is not available. Her contribution to the village goes far beyond her terms of employment and she is a very deserving recipient. Lesley was presented with the award by Clive Hill, editor of the Village Voice.

Nominations for the 2024/25 award can be submitted at any time and the award will be presented at our AGM in November. There is also a junior award although this is not held at present due to a lack of nominations. Planning

Dacorum Borough Council (DBC) launched a consultation on its new draft Local Plan in October 2023. The new Plan entitled 'Revised Strategy for Growth' covers the period to 2040 and attracted more than 1,300 comments. This new draft Local Plan followed DBC's initial consultation on an 'Emerging Strategy for Growth' which was published in October 2020.

The new Local Plan takes into account the extensive feedback from the first consultation and has been updated to reflect changes in the housing requirements and proposed improvements to infrastructure across the borough.

The plan proposes the building of 11,696 new homes up to 2040 which is 10% more than envisaged in 2020. A proportion of these houses will be built as part of the Hemel Garden Communities in conjunction with St Albans City and District Council (SADC). The plan includes proposals for at least 6 new primary schools and 2 new secondary schools as well as a revised hospital hub and new healthcare provision including extended and upgraded GP surgeries and health hubs. The town centre will be regenerated and there will be sustainable transport improvements including the regeneration of Hemel Hempstead train station. Planning

The only new housing development within the DBC boundary affecting Leverstock Green is a proposal to build 80 homes on land south of Green Lane adjacent to Westwick Row. This site is the remainder of the old Westwick Farm which was earmarked for housing many years ago. LGVA has expressed a number of concerns about this development including the further loss of green space, the history of flooding in the Green Lane area, the proposed density of the housing and the need to ensure access to the development is not from Westwick Row.

Finally, the Centurion Club has submitted a planning application to SADC proposing an expansion of the golf course by a further 10 holes. The extension would be to the south of the course on land which is currently part of a conifer plantation. There has been some speculation that the application may be linked to a proposal to include a retirement village within the complex. Details of the application are on the SADC Planning Application portal under reference 5/2023/2112. The opportunity to comment on the application expired on 14th February 2024.

Peter's Cars

Villagers who walk down Kendale to cut through the alleyway to the Crofts might have noticed an old red car sitting on a drive. This car is a 1936 Ford deluxe, now referred to as a CX tourer. There are only about 30 of these cars surviving worldwide.

This particular car was built in Dagenham by Ford then exported to New Zealand and reimported back to the UK in 1992.

Ford decided to make this model in the UK to replicate the American model 48. Instead of the big thirsty V8 engine Ford decided to use a much more economical 1172 cc engine in the UK version. They made the car smaller and did away with the running boards.

Peter is in the process of restoring this beautiful car. If you see him when walking past his house working on his car stop and have a chat with him as he is a font of knowledge on all things cars.

He told me that old Ford cars are interesting to drive, due to steering and suspension issues. They have been described as like a bloodhound following a wandering scent on a bumpy road and like a puppy on a polished lino when driving them on wet roads.



Holy Trinity Church celebrates its 175th Anniversary

Prior to 1849 Leverstock Green had no church of its own. In fact, the village was divided between three parishes: Hemel Hempstead, Abbots Langley, and St Michael's St Albans. In 1846, following a meeting of local worthies, it was decided that a new church should be built in Leverstock Green on land donated by the Earl of Verulam.

Despite various setbacks during the construction, the new church of Holy Trinity was eventually consecrated on October 30th 1849, and subsequently a

new parish of Leverstock Green was established in 1851.



Since then many changes have been made to both the church and the parish as the church has successfully sought to keep pace with the times. These include the installation of the clock in 1878, the organ in 1900, the oak Rood Screen in 1932 and central heating and electricity in 1939. The Trinity Room, with new vestries and modern facilities was added to the west end of the church in 1974 and has subsequently been refurbished. Over the last five years a sophisticated audio-visual system has been installed to live stream services and church events, which proved invaluable in keeping the church in touch with the community during the pandemic.



The latest example of keeping up with developments is the installation this year at a cost of nearly £40,000 of a new state-of-the-art heating system to replace the oil-fired boiler which has reached the end of its useful life. The new system uses under pew heaters based on the provision of renewable electricity and is the first of its kind in the Diocese of St Albans. It has the advantage of providing a valuable step towards achieving net zero carbon status for the church, and as a result, Holy Trinity is now being approached

by other churches to learn lessons from this latest project.

Holy Trinity Church

Regardless of the numerous changes and improvements over the years, the one thing that has never changed is Holy Trinity's place at the very heart both physically and spiritually of the Leverstock Green community. The church is here to serve the whole community and it does so by offering all sorts of activities to build social networks and support people in difficult circumstances, quite apart from offering worship and spiritual nurture for all ages.

As part of the 175th Anniversary celebrations, a celebration weekend is being arranged for 25th and 26th May. The church will be open for an exhibition on the church's history, and there will be a plant sale in the churchyard. We will be appealing for funds to recoup the cost of the new heating system, and to see us on our way towards the next 175 years! Sunday 26th May is Trinity Sunday, our 'patronal festival' and worship will be led by the Archdeacon of St Albans followed by our customary BBQ. All members of the village community are invited to visit Holy Trinity over the anniversary weekend to join in the celebrations.



Holy Trinity Vicar to Retire

The Revd Lizzie Hood, the Vicar of Holy Trinity Church Leverstock Green, has announced that she is to retire on 30th April this year. Lizzie has been in post for 12 years, initially serving the parish of Holy Trinity, Leverstock Green, but since 2018 has also been the Rector of the Benefice of Langelei - the senior priest in our team of 4 churches including Bennetts End, Apsley and Kings Langley. Lizzie also served a 5-year term as Rural Dean of Hemel Hempstead from 2015 to 2019. Her farewell service will be on Sunday 28th April at 3pm at Holy Trinity.



Lizzie has been a valued colleague and leader of our church family since 2012, and a much loved parish priest. She will be greatly missed and a hard act to follow. Many members of the local community, both those who are regular churchgoers and those who are not, have expressed their sadness that she will no longer be our village vicar and their gratitude for the tremendous contribution she has made to village life over the past 12 years.

Lizzie and her husband Tom plan to return to their family home in Abbots Langley, where Lizzie hopes to be able to devote more time to family life and her hobbies of music and gardening. Lizzie is also looking forward to becoming a grandparent for the first time later this year as her daughter and son-in-law are expecting their first baby in the summer.

We wish Lizzie a long and happy retirement with the grateful thanks of all the village residents for everything she has done on our behalf for the last 12 years.

Old Photographs of Leverstock Green

Recently an unknown lady visited the Village Hall and handed in the attached aerial photograph of Leverstock Green. It is not dated but I suggest it was taken around a couple of years either side of 1950. This is based on the fact that the start of Malmescroft and The

Horseshoe are shown around what was later to become the cricket field. Building there commenced in the early 1950s.



It is interesting to note that there is a grass triangle at the top of Green Lane and only the corner house appears to be built there. Curtis Road is only half its ultimate length and there are allotments on the top part of Westwick Field (now behind the Village Hall). Blacksmith's Row and Leverstock Green Farm are clearly visible in the foreground.

There were no houses in Bedmond Road beyond Chambersbury Lane and very few in St Albans Road beyond Pancake Lane.

Bunkers Park

Bunkers Park has, as some readers will be aware, been extended to include the two fields (known as Pond Field and Long Saunders) on the far side of Bunkers Lane. Access can be gained via the new gate installed last year in the lower far corner of Top Field. Care is necessary when crossing Bunkers Lane.

In late April or early May we can expect our annual visit of a small herd of Belted Galloway cattle from Box Moor Trust. These



are monitored on a daily basis by a small group of volunteers who are all local residents. We are now looking for a couple of new volunteers. The responsibilities consist of visiting the cattle approximately once every eight to ten days and checking for obvious signs of ill health or injury, checking that water troughs are full and a quick visual check of boundary fences. Once reaching the cattle this should take no more than five or ten minutes. A trained volunteer will accompany you on your first visit. Cultivating with Clive

This year we were led to believe that any soil containing peat would be banned. This was not the case as the government has not legislated for the ban. Please read the RHS statement below.

The Government has committed to banning the use of peat in retail bagged compost in 2024. Also, its use in professional horticulture in 2026 (with some exceptions to 2030). However, so far the government has failed to put in place legislation for these bans. So it remains unclear when the use of peat will be legally prohibited.

So with this in mind why don't all you lovely people of Leverstock Green make a commitment to go peat free this year?

The peat bogs in the UK and rest of the world are what are known as carbon sinks. These have absorbed carbon in the atmosphere over thousands of years. Did you know that 30cm deep layer of undisturbed peatland hold as much carbon as the same area as a rainforest? Once the peat bogs are drained and the peat is dried this is when the harmful carbon is released back in to the atmosphere causing damage to our planet.

The peat bogs also store water, prevent flooding and host a wide range of wildlife which is good for biodiversity.

If you go to the local garden centre you will see lots of peat free compost for sale. Look for the responsible scoring scheme, it has a logo (see pic 1) or you can scan the QR code this will tell you how reasonably sourced the compost is. Also watch out for bags that state environmentally sourced as if it doesn't say peat free you can bet it wont be!

You must treat peat free compost differently to peat compost.

You will be advised to cover the top layer of peat free compost with grit, sand or pearlite as this will help prevent Sciarid flies (I call then fruit flies) - the tiny black flies you might encounter in the summer in your kitchen or compost bin. They are harmless but very annoying. I would only do this when planting seeds or potting on plants. Just using peat free compost on the general garden you wont notice this problem. Also peat free compost will need less watering. The compost might look dry on the surface but will be wet a little further down the mixture. I lift the pot and see if any moisture drips out of the bottom of the pot. Also, because the peat free compost is extremely free draining it is a good idea to feed any

pots with a liquid feed, I use liquid seaweed once a week from March to the end of September. This will keep the medium full of nutrients all summer long.

You might also encounter small mushrooms growing from the compost, this is not a problem, it just lets you know the fungi are working to enhance the root growth. Just nip out the mushrooms and put them on your compost heap.

Peat free compost has a much shorter shelf life than peat compost, I would not personally use any that is more than 6 months old as the biologically active properties will have changed. Also don't store it in direct sunlight.

You might think this is all a bit of a pain. However, if we are serious about the future of our planet we all need to make small sacrifices to ensure a safer place for our children, grandchildren and future generations to live in years to come.

I am going to do some trials on various peat free composts and some I am going to make myself I will let you know how I get on over the next few months.

The club meets every Thursday night in Grovehill Community Centre at 7:30 for two hours. We meet like minded individuals. The music is supplied by relatively modern technology, we have loud speakers and a mini disc system. Street Champions

Our village and all the villages that surround the town centre continue to face the national issue of both litter and fly-tipping increasing year-on year.

We know resources are stretched, so what can we do to help?

There are now 1,467 registered volunteer "litter pickers" of the Dacorum Street Champions, including entire families, many being members of the DSC Facebook Group. In 2023, at least 1,533 bags of litter were collected by volunteers (610 recycling, 923 refuse). The true total is probably much higher as many are not reported. One-off litter picking events are supported by providing equipment for groups to borrow and collecting the bags. In 2023, there were 68 litter picking events...a further 850 bags of litter collected.

As a Street Champion, you will also be provided with the necessary kit including bags, picker, gloves and high-viz jacket and you are free to litter pick in any public space, provided you follow the guidance issued to you upon registration. There are already a number of Street Champions in the Leverstock Green area who tirelessly walk the streets and parks — from Three Cherry Trees Lane in the north to Bunkers Lane in the south.

Of course, you can litter pick without registering and many local residents can be seen collecting litter in their own bags which is great too.





Note that the Dacorum DSC bags can be left next to council bins. These will be collected by the Council's Clean, Safe and Green teams, or you can advise the council directly. To sign up, please go to website:


Speakers, including those from the prison charity PACT, a local housing officer, and a BBC news correspondent all extended our knowledge of wider society and other walks of life.

Defibrillator

Sudden Cardiac Arrest is a life-threatening condition in which your heart comes to a standstill and is not pumping blood any more. Within minutes, this puts your organs and whole body at risk of death. Emergency treatment includes CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) and defibrillation. CPR keeps enough oxygen in your lungs and gets to your brain until an electric shock restores a normal heart rhythm. CPR and defibrillators may save

your life. The symptoms of sudden cardiac arrest are fatigue, dizziness, shortness of breath, nausea, chest pain, heart palpitations (fast or pounding heart beat), loss of consciousness.

The Village defibrillator was bought in May 2016 from Community Heartbeat Trust (national charity focused on providing lifesaving defibrillation equipment) and they work in cooperation with the Ambulance Service. The defibrillator was paid for by LGVA with contributions from County Councillor Andrew Williams and The Parish Trust. LGVA are responsible for the running costs - electricity, replacement pads, replacement battery and the rescue kit. The village defibrillator is situated outside the village hall and the library.



If someone has the above symptoms:

- Call 999 immediately. They will provide you with the code for the nearest defibrillator cabinet.
- Start CPR even if it's hand-only. CPR can save a life. It keeps blood and oxygen circulating until help arrives
- The 999 call operator will talk you through when and how to use the defibrillator. The defibrillator will also "talk" through the life saving instructions too!

After the defibrillator was used Team Macy kindly paid for a replacement spare pads – very much appreciated. Thank you very much.
