Leverstock Green Football Club

Leverstock Green Football Club - Stadium Improvements Update

Leverstock Green FC has recently completed a series of important upgrades to our facilities to ensure the club meets the requirements for playing at Step 4 football.

After securing promotion to Step 4 in the 2023/24 season, we were required to make improvements in line with FA and Stadium Accreditation guidelines to remain at this level for the 2025/26 season. We were granted a season's grace to complete the necessary work, along with an extension until the end of July 2025 to finalise everything.





Thanks to the tireless efforts of our amazing volunteers, planning permission was secured, allowing us to build a brand-new 50-seater stand, a 100-capacity standing terrace, and a new toilet facility. We also installed perimeter fencing to screen the car park from the pitch and introduced new turnstiles—hand-built by one of our dedicated club volunteers.

Alongside these larger projects, a number of smaller tasks were also completed. We're delighted to share that, as of July 2025, Leverstock Green FC has officially been granted Grade 4 Stadium Accreditation. This ensures we can continue playing at Step 4 for the foreseeable future.



None of this would have been possible without the incredible support of our volunteers, supporters, sponsors, and the wider community. We're also hugely grateful to the management team and players, who have kept our football strong throughout this period of development.



A special thank you goes to **Lords Builders Merchants** for their ongoing support and help in sourcing materials to complete the works.

Thank you to everyone who has helped us reach this milestone—we look forward to welcoming you to the club soon!

The Fred Buglass Award


The Fred Buglass Award was instigated in 2002 using funds from the Fred Buglass Legacy. Fred lived in Leverstock Green for 45 years until his death in 1998 at the age of 93. Fred Buglass was responsible for the formation of LGVA in 1962 and a Life President.

The award recognises the people in the village who, by their actions, help make this a nice place to live and a community to be proud of, and who contribute positively to the village. It is for anyone who contributes significantly to the Leverstock Green community. A Youth Award was initiated in April 2003.

Nominations are required to be in by 1st September but can be made at any time during the year.

The Parish Trust was officially formed in 1992 following the sale of land in Pancake Lane where the original village hall stood. After the repair and maintenance of the Village Hall any remaining income may be used for the 'charitable purposes which are of general benefit to the residents of Leverstock Green'.

Some of the previous beneficiaries include the LGVA, local schools, tennis, football and cricket clubs, guide and scout organisation and the Holy Trinity Church.

Grants are not given to individuals.



You will also be able to choose who you would like to receive messages from – including the Police and Crime Commissioner, Neighbourhood Watch and Action Fraud. Your preferences will make your messages bespoke and not just related to your postcode.

In Leverstock Green PC Corey Siriwardana (right in picture) and Sergeant Roger Akhtar (left in picture) are currently attending local meetings to get their faces known in the area. Your local Neighbourhood Policing Team works to prevent crime and anti-social behaviour in this area. They also respond to issues or concerns, conduct regular patrols and hold surgeries to share crime prevention advice.

Other units also work in this area, responding to emergency calls (Intervention) and investigating crimes (Local Crime Unit).

Local Priority Issues

We seek to tackle the issues raised in line with our Local Policing Community Charter. There is genuine concern in Leverstock Green about the use of quad bikes, e-scooters etc around the area.

Leverstock Green has been highlighted as an area to be policed for ASB following a survey conducted by residents on the Herts Connect website.

LGVA newsletter update – September 2025

Further to our update in the last LGVA newsletter, The Crown Estate wish to thank the many residents who attended our last round of engagement events in July. We spoke to almost 200 people over 4 different events and we do appreciate the time and effort that residents have afforded us to share their views and ask questions.

Outline Planning Application

As part of our engagement, we have shared our timeline for the project and anticipate submitting an Outline Planning Application (OPA) in the Autumn to St Albans City & District Council (SADC). We have had lots of questions from residents about what is actually being submitted in the OPA and wanted to take this opportunity to explain a bit more about it, and what it will include.

The OPA consists of two core components, the Parameter Plans and the Development Specification.

Parameter Plans

The Parameter Plans will set the overall 'parameters' of the development such as the number of homes to be delivered and the amount of open space required. This will reflect the requirements set out for the site in the SADC draft Local Plan. The Parameter Plans will also seek to set the broad locations for different land uses within the site – for example which areas will be for housing, which areas will be designated for business. This will be shown as broad blocks on a site plan to indicate the locations where different uses will be and the overall extent of development, but does not show the detail of exactly where individual homes or buildings will be.

Development Specification

The Development Specification is prepared to be read alongside the Parameter Plans to provide more information including:

- A Description of Development which describes the type and Use Classes for the development within the application to provide certainty about what is being applied for;
- A schedule of Development Components which fixes maximum amounts of floorspace and/or areas to be approved; and
- A series of Spatial Principles providing an explanation of the key principles which will govern the detailed design and delivery of each of the spatial elements shown in the Parameter Plans.

In addition to the Parameter Plans and Development Specification, we are required to submit a number of technical reports such as an Environmental Impact Assessment and a Design and Access Statement. The Design and Access Statement (DAS) will be a useful document for people to understand the proposals for East Hemel within one document including how the design has evolved through technical and public consultation prior to submission. The information in the DAS will form the basis of design codes for different parts of the site which will be submitted for approval if we secure outline planning consent. These design codes will ensure the site is designed to a consistent and high standard. Once the OPA has been submitted to SADC in the Autumn, it will then need to go through various checks to ensure it meets the Councils' validation requirements which confirms they have all the documentation typically required to support an application of this nature. It will then be given a planning reference number and the Councils will then start their formal public consultation period. After the public consultation period has ended, the application will be assessed and the Councils will determine whether they require any further information or updates before the application is taken to Planning Committee for determination. Due to the scale of the development being proposed, this process could take between 12 and 18 months. A legal agreement (called a Section 106 agreement) will also need to be agreed with the Councils which sets out how infrastructure and facilities are to be provided.

We will continue to provide updates on the progress of the application on the East Hemel website: www.easthemel.co.uk.

What happens after the OPA is determined?

If the OPA is approved, work will then begin on evolving plans for the first phase of the development to come forward. This will involve working closely with the community on more detailed proposals for the first phase of the site, known as a 'Key Phase'. Once details to support the Key Phase are reviewed and determined by SADC, there will be the submission of 'Reserved Matters Applications' (RMAs). An RMA is an application for approval of specific details that were not approved as part of the Outline Planning Permission, such as details of the appearance and layout of buildings and landscaping details. All these details must be in accordance with the principles of development approved at the outline stage and will continue to meet relevant policy requirements before construction can begin. The public will be formally consulted on RMAs by the Council in the same way as with the OPA.

Working with the community

We are really grateful for the time and consideration that local residents and community groups have given to the project so far. Whilst we are not yet submitting detailed proposals, we have retained all the feedback residents have provided throughout our engagement so far to ensure these can be fed back into the more detailed design processes over the coming years. We would very much like to continue to collaborate and engage with the local community as the project progresses.


Shopping Centre Improvments

Councillors are planning a re-vamp to the Village Centre, to include signage, benches, planters, dog-stands and bicycle stands. This progress wouldn't have been possible without the incredible effort of our volunteers. A huge thank you goes to everyone in the village who gave their time and energy to get this completed.


We also held our open day in July. It was a great turn out and we're pleased to welcome many new members to the club and excited to see these new faces become part of our fantastic community.

I have served as a Borough Councillor in Leverstock Green Ward since May 2023 alongside my colleagues Cllr Jonathan Gale and Cllr Robin Bronham. It has been a pleasure working with the community during this time and getting to know you.

In my professional life I am a nurse who trained at Hemel Hospital and the University Of Hertfordshire. I worked at the hospital in Intensive Care until its closure in 2009. I worked at Watford Hospital for a few months before changing direction and working exclusively in the community. I trained as a Specialist Public Health Nurse in 2012 and went on to become a specialist in Safeguarding for both adults and children and eventually became a Designated Nurse for Safeguarding at the Integrated Care Board which was a strategic role supporting all the health providers in Hertfordshire with their safeguarding needs. I was responsible for all aspects of domestic abuse, violence against women and girls and a range of other portfolios. Alongside those roles I also worked with the police as a Forensic Nurse Examiner for victims of rape and sexual assault. In order to serve the community as mayor I have resigned from that role so I am no longer working full time.

During Covid I was redeployed in to a community nursing role (district nursing) and have worked two evenings a week for several years in that role which I am continuing during my mayoral year.

Some of the highlights have included playing Indoor Bowls with Angela Rippon who is very keen to encourage people to improve their health by dancing well into their older years and being a podcast guest with Simon Squibb who I am told has millions of followers and attended the business festival Ideas Fest, its is the Glastonbury of the business world.

Developed from a handful of teams in 1990 by founder Chris Brooks, we are now one of the largest clubs in the area and remain a volunteer-run charity to serve the local community.

WWI Soldier

H G Wells used a phase in his writing about WW1 saying, "WW1 was the war to end wars" he believed that the scale and devastation of WW1 would be so profound that it would deter future conflict.

My story starts in the Summer of 2020. Covid 19 had become part of our everyday life and the government made a ruling that we could only mix with a few family members. I had not been out for over a month, so I decided for a change of scenery I would take the two-minute walk over to our local church Holy Trinity in Leverstock Green. I took my reading book and found a bench to sit on. I noticed where I was sitting, a broken gravestone with the names of Alfred Harrowell (1851-1915) and Lizzie Harrowell nee Gill (1874-1965) and what caught my eye was the name under theirs was Frederick Harrowell killed in Palestine during WW1. I knew little if anything about the conflict in Palestine so I decided to find out more about Frederick Harrowell and the Sinai - Palestinian war.

Why were we in the Persian Gulf fighting the Ottoman Empire? - The British interests were in serious danger so the British Government decided to open up a defensive front in Mesopotamia (present day Iraq, Kuwait, and parts of Syria, Turkey and Iran) to weaken the Germans and their allies Austria-Hungary. The British were worried about other interests in the Middle East, the control of oil supplies and the need to secure a trade route i.e. Suez Canal.

The empire dissolved after its defeat in World War I, with the last Sultan deposed in 1922 and the Republic of Turkey established in 1923.

Fredrick Harrowell was born on 12 April 1894 to Alfred and Lizzie Alice nee Gill and was baptised at Holy Trinity Church in Leverstock Green. Fredrick was the eldest of four children the others were Emily Beatrice, James and Leonard. In the 1911 Census, the family lived at 2 Hillside, Cotterills Hill, Hemel Hempstead. In 1911 Fred was a printer at John Dickinson Company. In 1915 he enlisted as a Private in the Hertfordshire Yeomanry in the Household Cavalry and was sent to Palestine.

Fredrick died in Southern Palestine on 3rd October 1918 due to illness at the young age of 24. His death reflects the harsh condition the soldiers had to face: dysentery, trench fever, heat, dust and sanitation issues leading to infections etc. He is remembered on the gravestone of his parents Alfred & Lizzie at Holy Trinity Church in Leverstock Green and his name appears on the Leverstock Green war memorial. He was actually buried thousands of miles from home in the Ramleh War Cemetery which is now part of Israel. He was awarded The British War Medal and The Victory Medal posthumously.

So like many of our soldiers and allies in WW1 Fredrick Harrowell paid the ultimate price for our freedom today. If you just take a walk around Holy Trinity Churchyard and see a broken headstone near a bench with flowers on it, then that was me thanking a gallant soldier long ago but not forgotten.

What's in Your Garden?

It's been a good year for nature in my garden and around Leverstock Green. My highlight of the year was hearing a Treecreeper in Chambersbury Lane on 29th July while taking a short walk over Bunkers Park. This I was able to identify by using the Merlin Bird app on my phone and getting in touch with the local RSPB of which I am a member to get their thoughts on my findings. They also conduct the Bunkers Park bird surveys which results can be found here - https://ebird.org/hotspot/L11434509/bird-list

My previous highlight of the summer was on the same walk but on entering Bunkers Park I saw a fritillary butterfly but alas it would not stay still long enough for me to be get a snap! It could have been one of three species – the Silver-washed, the High Brown or the Dark Green.

In the garden there has been a variety of wildlife (not including bunnies and guinea pigs on holiday) but firstly butterflies. The earliest being on 7th March when two brimstones were out, along with a speckled wood, holly blues and orange tips. Over the summer there has been a lot of small white butterflies, small and holly blues, gatekeepers, tortoiseshells, peacocks and on the 21st June the first Comma butterfly visited. One moth we had in the kitchen was a yellow shell moth, I had never even heard of it but members from my local wildlife WhatsApp group were able to identify it for me.

We have had a good variety of birds in the garden this summer with robins, jackdaws, great tits, blue tits, long tailed tits, starlings and their noisy young, robins, sparrows and woodpigeons to name a few. We have been lucky to have two different species of tits nesting in our boxes this year. The blue tits surprisingly chose a new box that was a Christmas present from my friend Carol and only put up in early January. The great tits nested in an existing box on the opposite side of the garden. These baby great tits gave me many heart attacks seeing them poking out through the hole waiting for food to come back that I thought they were going to fall out. Thankfully the blue tits weren't so adventurous. The great tits were first to leave (fledge) on 19th May with the blue tits following on 24th May.

On the 26th May Roy espied a goldcrest bathing in the fountain of our patio pond but it was gone before either of us could get our phones out of our pockets, let alone put in the password!

Going back to the tits on the 29th & 30th May, scruffy adult blue tits were taking fat away presumably to feed young. Then on the 8th June the two adults were back with three babies on the bird feeder which was a lovely treat.

In August we did have a wood pigeon nesting but the egg appeared not to have been fertilised after 4 weeks and was abandoned.

Throughout the summer the green necked parakeets kept coming back for a while and then disappearing. While writing this at the end of August they are back attracted to the beech nuts that are forming on the trees next door. I don't get them on my feeders yet.......

Apart from the fish in our three ponds we have been blessed with fully grown frogs and toads and damselflies flitting around. It is well known that our grass has not been cut for 5 years giving us a natural food for the bunnies (Roy calls this child labour) and wild flowers that attract the butterflies. Apart from this we have a wild flower area that allows more nectar for the butterflies and bees.




